The Building Stones of England

England's rich architectural heritage owes much to the great variety of stones used in buildings and other structures. The building stones commonly reflect the local geology, imparting local distinctiveness to historic towns, villages and rural landscapes.

Historic England and the British Geological Survey (BGS), working with local geologists and historic buildings experts, have compiled the **Building Stones Database for England** to identify important building stones, where they came from and potential alternative sources for repairs and new construction.

Drawing on this research, plus BGS publications and fieldwork, guides like this one have been produced for each English county. The guides are aimed at mineral planners, building conservation advisers, architects and surveyors, and those assessing townscapes and countryside character. The guides will also be of interest if you want to find out more about local buildings, natural history, and landscapes.

Each guide includes references for the area covered. This volume offers more general references for books and online resources on geology, building stones, mineral planning, and building conservation plus contact details for building stone collections, and geology and building conservation organisations.

The lexicon provides definitions of the lithostratigraphic, lithodemic and lithomorphogenetic geological units of the UK and its continental shelf. It focuses mainly on geological units of member, formation and group rank (and equivalent) but it also includes information on some units of lesser rank, notably economically important coal seams and laterally extensive marine bands. The lexicon includes superficial and bedrock units, plus synonyms and other names that are not currently recognised by the BGS or regarded as obsolete.

Historic Environment Records

The Historic Environment Records (HER) (sometimes referred to as Sites and Monuments Records) are sources of, and signposts to, information relating to landscapes, buildings, monuments, sites, places, areas and archaeological finds.

The HERs may be held by county councils, district councils or unitary authorities. In each case, the record will cover the whole of the local authority area. Selected major historic towns and cities are covered by Urban Archaeological Databases (UADs). In many cases, UADs are held as part of, and are accessible via, the local HER.
